This summer, he will take up another postdoctoral scholar position in the department of neuroscience at Columbia University.



WOLFGANG MARTIN PAULI

Artificial Intelligence Developer, Microsoft Research Artificial Intelligence

Postdoctoral Scholar in Neuroscience Pauli spent the last

few years in HSS, working in the O'Doherty lab. His research focused on the neural computational mechanisms of human decision-making, particularly regarding the role of inference about decision-structure in choice performance. Since leaving HSS, he joined Microsoft Research Artificial Intelligence (MSR AI) in Washington.



KEITH PLUYMERS

Assistant Professor of History, Illinois State University

As the inaugural Howard E. and Susanne C. Jessen Postdoctoral Instructor in the Humanities,

Pluymers taught several undergraduate courses focused on environmental history. He was the recipient of teaching awards from both HSS and the Associated Students of the California Institute of Technology (ASCIT). Pluymers' first book project, under contract with the University of Pennsylvania Press, examines ideas about wood scarcity and English colonial expansion into Ireland and the Atlantic World during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. In the fall, he will become an assistant professor of history at Illinois State University.



DIRK SCHEELE

Postdoctoral Scholar, Klinik und Poliklinik für Psychiatrie und Psychotherapie, University of Bonn

Scheele was a postdoctoral scholar in the Adolph's lab

where he worked on a project in social neuroscience involving fMRI studies in autism. In March, he left HSS to start another postdoctoral scholar position at the Klinik und Poliklinik für Psychiatrie und Psychotherapie (Clinic and Polyclinic for Psychiatry and Psychotherapy) at the University of Bonn in Germany.



ANITA TUSCHE

Assistant Professor, Queen's University

As a postdoctoral scholar in neuroeconomics in the Adolph's lab, Tusche's research focuses on computational and neurobiological

foundations of altruism, including the design of fMRI experiments, collection of data, and sophisticated statistical analyses. Later this year, she will join the faculty of Queen's University in Ontario, Canada, as an assistant professor in the economics and psychology departments.

CLASS OF 2018

Among the seniors expected to graduate in June, 15 percent (36 out of 241) are completing an option (major) or minor in the humanities or social sciences. One student chose to pursue Business, Economics, and Management (BEM) as his first and only option. Twenty-seven students selected one of our tracks for their second option (double major): nine in BEM, two in English, 12 in History, and four in Philosophy. And eight students completed a humanities minor: four in English, two in History, and two in Philosophy.
